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## Sea turtle fines

Sea turtles are among the most magnificent residents of the Caribbean, but they are also among the most endangered. Overfishing, pollution and degradation of nesting areas have made life more difficult for the region's green, loggerhead, leatherback and falcon sea turtles. On the bright side, there are a number of major initiatives underway to preserve and protect sea turtles, and many of a Caribbean resort now includes sea turtle-focused activities and education among its guest offerings - especially in summer and fall, which is the nesting season for sea turtles in the Caribbean. Bequia, a charming island in the Grenadines, is home to an important sea turtle rescue and breeding program, the hegg turtle sanctuary. St. Kitts is also building a marine turtle interpretation centre on Key Beach; the facility will serve as a hub for visits and educational activities of the St. Kitts Sea Turtle Monitoring Network. Watt Jim/Getty Images Some resorts, such as the Wyndham Grand Rio Mar Beach Resort and Spa in Puerto Rico, simply arrange for guests to attend sea turtles coming ashore to lay their eggs on nearby beaches, or to see the exciting time when newborn turtles leave their nests and make their way back to the sea, where only one in 1000 will survive as adults. (Wyndham partners with Puerto Rico's Department of Natural Resources to ensure the safety of guests and turtles.) At the Club Resort in Barbados, an inexpensive and fast excursion just down the west coast of the island gives guests the opportunity to swim with leatherback turtles in their natural environment, attracted by the bread and leftover fish thrown into the water. Bolongo Bay Beach Resort in St. Thomas is planning a similar trip on its catamaran Heavenly Days at Turtle Cove on Buck Island. The GoldenEye Hotel and Resort in Jamaica guarantees guests who stay five nights or more in September the chance to see sea turtles hatch on Golden Sea Beach, where more than 10,000 turtles emerge from the sand between May and September each year. For a small fee, hotel guests are taken on an hatching trip by a local sea turtle expert. Paul Souders/Getty Images Others, such as the St. Regis Bahia Beach Resort in Puerto Rico, give guests the opportunity to participate in conservation efforts. The station's leatherback turtle program is led by an on-site marine biologist, helping the property become the Caribbean's first international gold-signature gold sanctuary. Even some of Anuba's liveliest beaches have nesting sea turtle populations; Fortunately, the island is also home to one of the most respectful hotels in in the Caribbean, Bucuti - Tara Beach Resorts. The station supports the local sea turtle foundation, Turtugaruba, and organizes two educational seminars each year on the conservation of sea turtles - one on Earth Day, the other on the first day of the turtle nesting season. The Rosalie Bay Resort of Dominica is lucky to have nest nests three types of sea turtles (green, falcon beak and leatherback turtle); The station founded the island's sea turtle conservation program and uses guests to patrol beaches to protect nesting turtles, help researchers collect data or help move nests that are too close to the ocean from shore to the station's turtle hatchery. One of the most comprehensive sea turtle programs in the Caribbean is at the Four Seasons Resort Nevis, of which pinney's Beach is a major nesting site for the critically endangered falcon turtle as well as other species. The resort has had a long-standing partnership with the Nevis Turtle Group and the Sea Turtle Conservancy to protect these turtles and involve customers in a variety of related initiatives, including: Educational Programs Turtle adoptions Beach patrols A weekly sea turtle camp for children that includes turtle tales, turtle watch beach walks, arts and crafts, postcard drawing contest, interactive games, puzzles and videos. During the turtle nesting season, which runs from June to October, children aged three to nine participating in the turtle education program for children for all seasons receive a sea turtle adoption certificate and a Sea Turtle Conservancy membership. In Mexico's Riviera Maya, Xcaret Eco-Park also features a turtle sanctuary that periodically frees newborns back to the sea and invites visitors to enjoy the show. The nearby Barcelo Maya Beach Resort also protects its resident sea turtles and invites guests to observe them to hatch each year. Turtles are born on Heron Island and return about 30 years later, ready to lay their eggs and complete the circle of life. This annual phenomenon is a sight not to be missed, especially when migrating turtles and their newborns join the 4,000 local turtles that reside permanently on the island. As general manager of Heron Island Resort Sandy McFeeters shares, there is no other view quite like it. Heron Island is truly an amazing place to be part of the annual laying and hatching of green and loggerhead turtles, she says. Watching these giants of the sea hang out on the beach and settle down to lay up to 120 eggs per brood is one of the most amazing and breathtaking things to see. Seeing this incredible chick perform before your eyes, all you need to do is wait a few hours after the high tide of the evening and then walk along the peaceful heron beach. When you see a couple, you know you're close to babies as well. Remember to keep an eye on the tracks in the sand, which show where the turtles emerged from the ocean. Be sure to focus on the newborns, who will rush to the safe ocean once they are born.
